

Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year B) 7th July, 2024

"Recognising a God that is close to Us."

When we think about the people in this Gospel, we might say they knew Jesus, but they did not recognise him. There is a difference between knowing and recognizing. In essence, this difference makes us understand that we can know various things about a person, form an idea, rely on what others say about that person, we might perhaps meet that person every now and then in the neighbourhood; but all that is not enough. This is a knowledge, that does not recognise the uniqueness of the person. We all run this risk: we think we know so much about a person, even worse, we use labels and close the person within our own prejudices. Jesus's fellow villagers knew him for thirty years in the same way and they thought they knew everything! "But isn't this the boy we saw growing up, the carpenter, the son of Mary? Where did this man get all this?" In reality, they never realised who Jesus truly was. They remained at the exterior level and refused what was unique about Jesus.

But why didn't Jesus's fellow villagers recognise and believe in Him? What is the reason? I think that they did not accept the reality of the Incarnation. They did not know this mystery of the Incarnation. The Incarnation is indeed difficult to accept, that the immensity of God should be revealed in the smallness of our flesh, that the Son of God should be apparently the son of a carpenter, that the divine should be hidden in the human, that God should inhabit the face, the words, the gestures of a simple man.



This is the heart of the Christian faith: the incarnation of God, his concreteness, his participation in daily life. God in becoming a human being in the person of Jesus of Nazareth, has became a companion on the way, he made himself one of us. "You are one of us", we can say to Jesus. What a beautiful prayer! It is because he is one of us he understands us, accompanies us, forgives us, loves us so much.

Very often, like the villagers in this gospel we fail to recognise a God that is close to us, we often prefer an abstract, distant god, it makes us more comfortable, one that doesn't get himself involved in everyday situations and who causes a faith that is far from life, from problems, from society. But that is not the God that Jesus reveals. God incarnated Himself: God is humble, God is tender, God is hidden, he draws near to us, living the normality of our daily life. *Behold, a virgin shall be with child, and shall bring forth a son, and they shall call his name Emmanuel, which means, God with us.* God is with us, the challenge is to recognise how close he is!

Freedom to Live Fully, Until Death – providing compassionate care at the end of life

To address the sensitive issue of compassionate care at the end of life, and in response to the need to inform the faithful of Catholic teaching on this important life issue that affects so many families, the Bishops of Ireland have published the pastoral letter: Freedom to Live Fully, Until Death Comes. You are invited to read this letter and view the video Through the Valley, which offers personal testimonies by carers and people with terminal illness. The key message of both letter and video asserts that every person possesses inherent, infinite dignity that remains intact regardless of their circumstances. In this context, bishops strongly oppose the Oireachtas Committee's proposal to Government to legislate for assisted suicide, and call on support for healthcare workers who uphold the sanctity of life.
